1. Course Description

This course introduces the basics of Koine Greek, the original language of the New Testament. We will learn Greek grammar step by step, covering the syntax of verbs, nouns, pronouns, prepositions, and more. The course also aims to equip students with effective methods for memorizing vocabulary and recognizing various syntactical features. In addition to grammar instruction, a substantial amount of time will be devoted to reading and analyzing texts to help students become familiar with the language. Emphasis will also be placed on practicing pronunciation and translating simple texts.

2. Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, you should be able to:

- 1. Recognize frequently occurring Greek words in the New Testament.
- 2. Read aloud with confidence several New Testament Greek passages.
- 3. Develop a habit of reading the New Testament Greek Bible alongside the Chinese or English Bible.
- 4. Analyze and evaluate basic morphological transformations and syntactic structures.
- 5. Translate simple Greek sentences into English.

This course will cover chapters 1-12 of the textbook plus supplementary materials supplied by the teacher. Topics covered are as follows:
